STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

CONSTITUTION

The Society is a Company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association (last amended December 2004), and is a recognised charity. The Council of the Society is the board of directors of the company and the board of Trustees of the charity. For brevity and clarity throughout this report, except where it is necessary to distinguish, the directors and trustees are referred to only as the Trustees, and the company and charity is referred to as the Society.

Trustees – Members of the Society's Council

The Council, as the board of Trustees, manages the whole business of the Society. It usually meets formally at least four times in each year and there is frequent other contact and correspondence between Trustees throughout the year.

The Treasurer and Secretary are appointed by the Council, being ex-officio Trustees if not elected Trustees. Other Trustees are elected at an AGM for three years and may stand for re-election. After nine consecutive years an elected Trustee must stand down for at least one year. All members of the Society are eligible for nomination for election as a Trustee if nominated by two other members of the Society, there being an AGM vote if there are more nominations than vacancies. Trustees are made aware of their charity and company law responsibilities and of the Society's recent financial performance.

The Board of Trustees needs to be strengthened by recruiting UK based Society members with appropriate experience and qualifications, including in modern communications and in business. Trustees are expected to make a strong contribution to the activities and administration of the charity and those interested should contact the Secretary.

OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

The Society is an educational charity. Its activity for the public benefit is to seek to increase and extend interest in and knowledge of heraldry, armory, chivalry, genealogy and allied subjects. We have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

As an educational charity, the Society publishes a learned journal, *The Coat of Arms*, and a regular bulletin, *The Heraldry Gazette*. The Society also arranges lectures, conferences, social functions and visits to places of heraldic interest. The lectures are open to all members of the public free of charge; other events are restricted to members and their guests, normally with a charge to cover function costs.

During the year under review the Society ran its usual programme of lectures, one at The RAF Club and eight at the Society of Antiquaries at Burlington House. We visited Strawberry Hill House, Twickenham in April 2016. We held our Annual Reception at Barnard's Inn, High Holborn, London in July 2016 and our annual Anniversary Lunch at the Royal Air Force Club, Piccadilly, London in February 2017. We held our Biennial Congress at the University of Worcester in August 2016, the topic being 'Early Heraldry'.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITIES

Charity and Company Law require the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Society, and of the income and expenditure for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- Follow acceptable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Society will continue to operate.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Society and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Society and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Society's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting & Reporting by Charities', effective January 2015.

RESULTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

As is normal every second year, in the year under review events income was substantially boosted by the Biennial Congress. The Congress and other charged for events broke even.

The loss (net expenditure) for the year was £18,759 compared with a £25,838 loss last year. This year's only major non-recurring cost was the £3,938 cost of moving the Society's library to its new home in Canterbury. £1,475 of publications and printing costs related to last year.

RESERVES

For many years the Society maintained a second unrestricted fund in addition to its General Reserve. This fund, named the Development Fund, represented monies set aside by Trustees some years ago for the development of the objects of the Society; its balance had not changed for several years. Having regard to recent years' reported losses the Trustees have transferred the Development Fund to the General Reserve.

A review of recent years' accounts has shown that amounts which should have been charged to Restricted Funds were instead charged to General Reserve. An adjustment has been made in the 2017 accounts to correct these errors as of 1 April 2016, charging £6,440 to the Kirby Fund, £992 to the Sponsored Lectures Fund (so exhausting that Fund), and £3,000 to The John Brooke-Little Memorial Lecture Fund; this latter fund is also now exhausted after funding the relevant lecture in the year under review.

The Society's one remaining Restricted Fund, the Kirby Special Projects Fund, is money given by the Kirby family and their Trusts for projects whose aim is the advancement of heraldry. Although only the income earned by the Fund is available for grants from the Fund, for several years the Fund was invested in non-income earning cash balances. The Fund is now invested in an interest bearing account, though interest rates are very low. Fortunately the Fund balance includes sufficient income earned in earlier years to allow the grants made from 2014 to 2017 to be charged to the Fund.

The loss for the year and these adjustments mean that at 31 March 2017 the balance on the General Reserve (now including the previous Development Fund) amounts to £74,972 compared to £80,960 for the two funds combined at 31 March 2016.

In the view of the Trustees there is adequate cash in the unrestricted and restricted funds to meet the Society's obligations.

RISKS AND STRATEGY

The Trustees have considered the main risks which the Society faces, and have taken appropriate action to reduce them where possible and to mitigate their potential effect. The risks are largely operational, and are managed by relevant measures, for example to protect the Society's funds and other assets and to ensure new publications of high standard.

The Trustees are aware that the Society depends largely on members' subscriptions as its source of funds and on members' *pro bono* contributions to its work, and that it is vital to maintain members' interest and participation, through the Society's publications, meetings and website.

The Board has reviewed its own governance of the Society, and will seek to ensure that it is able to provide the necessary direction and control and to organise succession.

Over recent years our number of subscribing members and hence the Society's income have been reducing. But costs have not been reducing and there has been exceptional expenditure. Therefore the Society's accounts have reported significant losses and net cash expenditure, year by year. These regular losses must be stemmed. The Society's affairs must be re-organised so that our expenditure is less than our income, our only substantial income being members' subscriptions. The Council is planning the necessary strategy, which is likely to include the following:

The new Honorary Membership Secretary and the new Honorary Treasurer, who both took office a year ago, are seeking to rebuild members' confidence in the Society's membership administration. Membership now seems stable at about 600 annually subscribing, life and reciprocal members.

The Society's publications, their content, style and frequency and their production arrangements, are under review. The Trustees know that the quality and content of our publications and their value for money are fundamental both to our membership (and hence to our income) and to our mission as an educational charity. Changes will aim only to improve.

Once the quality and content of our publications have been stabilized, subscription levels will be reviewed, with value for money in mind as well as the long term sustainability of the Society.

Our website will be replaced. The attractive and informative new website will be easy to keep up to date. An online shop will enable members and others to buy from our large stock of publications, second hand books and merchandise as well as to pay subscriptions and join the Society.

We will seek to strengthen our Board of Trustees with experienced and appropriately qualified Society members.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of financial statements. Notes to the Financial Statements 31 March 2017

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared (a) under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts; and (b) in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015, referred to as 'SORP 2015').

Preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported as assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported as revenues and expenses during the year. Actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. No judgements made have had a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Fixed Assets

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Fixtures and equipment:

25% of written down value

Computer equipment

33% of cost

Library

5% of cost

The Society's slide collection is included at a nominal value of £1 because, in the opinion of the Council, it has no resale value.

Stocks

Having regard to the nature and age of the stocks, it is considered that at 31 March 2017 net realisable value should be taken as £ nil (31 March 2016 £ nil).

Income – Subscriptions

Income is recognised once the Society has entitlement to it, it is probable that it will be received and its amount can be measured reliably. Annual membership and magazine subscriptions are due on 1 January in each year for the ensuing calendar year but are only recognised when received in cash, 75% of the cash receipts between January and March being carried forward for the credit of the next financial year and included in creditors as income in advance.

Subscriptions from life members are credited to income over 12 years.

Financial instruments

The Society has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. These are initially recognised at transaction value and are then measured at amortised cost. Financial assets held at amortised cost comprise cash at bank and debtors. Financial liabilities held at amortised cost are creditors (including accruals).

Cash at bank includes short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account, if any.

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the Society has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Such financial liabilities are recognised at cost, no amortisation being necessary.

Funds

SORP 2015 requires the financial statements to show the funds of the Society divided into unrestricted income funds, income funds which are restricted as to their use, and capital funds. Unrestricted funds include those which have been designated for specific purposes by the charity itself. Restricted funds are those donated for specific purposes.

The Society's funds are classified as follows:

Unrestricted Funds:

General Reserve — represents undesignated monies retained which provide the working capital to enable the Society to carry out its activities. The former Development Fund was transferred to the General Reserve as of 1 April 2016.

Restricted Funds:

The Kirby Special Projects Fund represents money donated by the Kirby family and their Trusts for projects whose aim is the advancement of heraldry. Only income which has been earned by the Fund is available for grants from the Fund. A review of past years' accounts showed that costs which should have been charged to the fund had not been charged to it although there was sufficient unutilised income available from earlier years, and a consequential transfer was made as of 1 April 2016.

The Sponsored Lectures Fund represented monies given by sponsors for future lectures and had to be used for that purpose. A review of past years' accounts showed that costs of the relevant lectures had not been charged to that Fund as they should have been. A consequential transfer was made as of 1 April 2016, so exhausting the Fund.

The John Brooke-Little Memorial Lecture Fund represented monies given to sponsor an annual lecture in memory of John Brooke-Little, the Society's Founder, who died in February 2006. A review of past years' accounts showed that costs of the relevant lectures had not been charged to that Fund as they should have been. A consequential transfer was made as of 1 April 2016. The cost of the relevant lecture in the year ended 31 March 2017 has since exhausted the Fund. The Lecture will continue to be held annually, its costs being charged to the General Reserves through the annual statement of financial activities.

2. Status

The Society is a company registered in England under the Companies Act 2006 and is recognised under The Charities Act 2011. It is limited by guarantee with no share capital. Its income is mainly subscriptions from members in the UK and overseas. The loss for the year is attributable to UK activities.

Clive Alexander
